Training Centre Pottery Project



The versatility of the projects within our centre to inspire and enthuse some of our vulnerable learners, is getting under way with our newly started pottery sessions, led by Paul Sheppard, a client himself and client's representative on our board of Trustees.

As a budding artist himself, Paul is inspiring others to meet new challenges through artistic projects. Pottery offers a unique and therapeutic outlet for self-expression, creativity, and personal growth. Vulnerable learners can use clay as a medium to convey their thoughts, emotions, and experiences, which can be especially therapeutic for those who may struggle to communicate in other

ways, and provide a creative task that can support their confidence and sense of accomplishment.

Allison has been working with Paul and told me she was so happy being able to make her own coasters, add a design and paint in her favourite colours. She is looking forward to her next session when she will be varnishing her designs and is so pleased with what she has achieved that she may keep one for herself, rather than give them all as Christmas gifts.

Paul says:


"I enjoy trying to create different things with materials I haven't tried yet, so wanted to share that experience with clients in Compaid's centre. Together, we've made vases and other small ornaments, and painted them with acrylic paints and water-based ink. I've also tried mixing terracotta-colour clay with ordinary grey clay for a rustic effect, so no paint is required on the outside of a glass vase.

"I've been enjoying showing people how to make things with clay. Now I've expanded into polymer clay, which allows you to make things like jewellery and keyrings in many colours."

Completing this pottery project and seeing the final result has provided Allison and others with a great sense of accomplishment. We look forward to seeing the creativity discovered in this and our other upcoming projects.
